A silent auction of some 58 items closed following dinner and a live auction of another 15 plus items was conducted by auctioneer Bob Kambarn of Allen. Good-natured competition and lively bidding provided for some additional entertainment for the assembled crowd after enjoying dessert of Smith Island cake and coffee.

Guests included longtime residents, come-here's and visitors residing in at least five states. Sen. Jim Mathias and Del. Mary Beth Carozza, both candidates for Maryland's District 38 Senate seat, were there and interacted with many of the assembled guests and GCAC Board members.

Auction items were donated by more than 60 individuals and regional businesses. GCAC board members reported outstanding support from business owners in and around Crisfield and will publish a full list of sponsors and contributors, thanking them for their generous support.

These include conducting feasibility studies for: 1) a water taxi service connecting Somers Cove Marina, the City Dock, Janes Island State Park and other destinations; 2) a boardwalk connecting the marina to downtown to support local waterfront businesses; and 3) a possible waterpark to attract visitors and provide jobs and recreation for the local community.

All of these initiatives are part of GCAC's Five Year Action Plan published in 2016 and may be read in its entirety on the website at www. GreaterCrisfieldMD.org/plan.

In addition to funds raised through the gala, GCAC was also recently notified that it is the recipient of an \$18,000 Technical Assistance Grant from the Maryland Department of Housing and Community Development. This grant is to be used to support the planning and feasibility studies needed to advance the Five Year Action Plan.

Director Keith Campbell said after the event: "There are three significant things I am taking away from this experience. First, what a wonderful job my wife Fran, Linda Singh, and Linda Riggin did in planning and executing this event. Second, how many people approached me during the gala to say that they were totally committed to the goals of GCAC and would do whatever they could to assist us. And third, in the days after the event, how many people have said that they had a wonderful time and are looking forward to next year.

"And I also want to express my gratitude to all of the sponsors, contributors, volunteers, and attendees who made our first gala such an outstanding success."
